



Introduction



According to experts and activists, India is home to around 14 million blind and 28 million visually impaired people who, despite legislations like the Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights, and Full Participation) Act, 1995 (commonly referred to as the Persons with Disabilities Act or PWD Act), are amongst the most disempowered sections in the country.


At Score Foundation, we have learnt from experience that the real problem is not blindness; rather it is the traditional mindset and biases, which undervalue the potential of the visually impaired and force them to live a marginalized and undignified life. It is our core commitment to integrate them with the rest of the society and ensure that they get their rightful due in terms of openings and opportunities.

It's a commitment that we seek to meet by harnessing the power of knowledge, which can change lives by providing directions, influencing thinking, motivating, and helping the visually disabled people to understand their potential. Unfortunately, the relevant information that is required to make it happen is scattered, outdated or incomplete, and many a times inaccessible. This is what prompted us to launch Project Eyeway in 2003. It is a single-stop national knowledge resource where the objective is to make available information that is relevant, timely, and delivered across a range of media. And to make sure this information reaches every strata of the society, we decided to provide it through the following channels—radio shows, helpdesk, website, and training programmes.

As per the UN Convention on the Rights of People with Disabilities (UNCRPD 2007)

"...it is the right of people with disability to be provided information that would enable them to realize their potentials and live more comfortably with the provisions of society".

Realising the goals we set our sights on



Radio



Running successfully in its third season, our Hindi radio show, titled *Eyeway - Yeh Hai Roshni Ka Karawan*, continued to inform, inspire, and include people with visual impairments. Launched in November 2005, the radio show has proved to be an effective tool for Eyeway to reach those, who were hitherto unreachable, particularly in the Hindi speaking belt of the rural areas and in sectors outside the rehabilitation and educational efforts of government and other NGOs.

The informative, yet entertaining manner of presentation has been greatly admired by many who eagerly waited for their favourite show on All India Radio's (AIR) Vividh Bharati network in 30 cities from 9 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on Wednesdays. However, this weekly radio show had to be discontinued after April 23, 2008 due to a sharp increase in its airtime costs by AIR, which turned out to be two-and-a-half times the earlier cost. We tried contacting the relevant authorities in order to sensitise them into giving us discounted rates, since ours is not a commercial show, but we haven't been successful so far. Nevertheless, with support from Tech Mahindra Foundation, we decided to adopt an alternative strategy of continuing the show on a reduced scale.

The radio show resumed on September 24, 2008 as a fifteen-minute show at 9 p.m. on every 2nd and 4th Wednesday of the month on the same network of Vividh Bharati.

Our radio show includes an interview or radio feature, profile of a blind role model, and a contest, as well as lots of useful and interesting information. During the year, the radio feature has taken up issues like banking, blindness due to injuries, examination related issues, parenting of blind children, using white cane for independent mobility, and so on.

Eyeway - Yeh Hai Roshni Ka Karawan is aired in the following cities:

Guwahati, Patna, Delhi National Capital Region (NCR), Rajkot, Surat, Vadodara, Ahmedabad, Jammu, Srinagar, Jamshedpur, Ranchi, Jabalpur, Bhopal, Indore, Nagpur, Mumbai, Pune, Cuttack, Chandigarh, Jalandhar, Jaipur, Jodhpur, Udaipur, Varanasi, Allahabad, Kanpur, Lucknow, Kolkata, and Siliguri. In our effort to provide the visually impaired a platform to showcase their abilities, this year, instead of celebrities we had visually impaired people with good voice skills to render the profiles.

Experienced radio professionals, Arshad Iqbal and Salima Raza, continued to anchor the shows. The shows are also available on our website for online listening at www.eyeway.org/includes/radio

Helpdesk



The Eyeway helpdesk is a rehabilitation and information service where our counsellors respond to phone calls, emails, and letters from across the country on living life with blindness and low vision. The helpdesk is promoted by our radio show, and is powered by the Eyeway website and our rehabilitation expertise.

During the year, the helpdesk received 585 queries from all over the country. It was encouraging to see the calls still coming in, in spite of the radio show being off the air between May and September 2008, though there was a drop in the numbers.

Listening showed us the way to greater efficiency

In 2008, with support from Ericsson India, we invested in an EPABX system along with call recording facility. This has significantly helped us in efficiently handling calls and in documentation of our work.

Eyeway helpdesk continued to receive calls from right across the country. Some of the prominent issues raised in the calls were:

- Parenting
- Discrimination (particularly at work place and in availing banking services)
- Guidance for moving on with life after having lost sight
- Academic guidance (especially about scribes and extra time for exams)
- Career guidance
- · Accessible reading and study material
- Job opportunities
- Legal and human rights

Interactions that are Eye-Openers

An e-discussion group (Google group) for MBA and commerce students was created in June 2008 and has

grown to have a membership of more than 60 people. The members include students, chartered accountants, and management consultants who are blind. There are a few members from Pakistan as well. It is heartening to see the group evolving as a peer support platform where they share their problems, solutions, learning material, and experiences.

Many of the queries we receive on our helpdesk, require support and intervention that are at times beyond the scope of Eyeway's physical or functional reach. In such cases, we connect our helpdesk callers to other individuals/organisations. Notable few include:

Individuals: Kanchan Pamnani, Mumbai and S.C. Vashishth, New Delhi for legal issues.

Organisations: Human Rights Law Network; National Association for the Blind (NAB), New Delhi and Mumbai; All India Confederation of Blind (AICB), New Delhi; Saksham, New Delhi; National Institute of Visually Handicapped (NIVH), Dehradun; Pune Blind Men's Association, Pune; EnAble India, Bangalore; Karishma Enterprises, Mumbai (for assistive aids and technology); and Access India, a mailing list based support group of visually impaired people in India.

Website

Eyeway.org continued to serve as a comprehensive online storehouse of information about leading a fulfilling life with blindness. Launched in 2004, the researched and updated information on the website is classified into three main sections—informs, inspires, and includes. These three sections further have sub-sections that contain a wide array of information for our users starting from eye care, parenting, education related information to inspirational stories about the lives of visually impaired achievers as well as jobs and events of interest. There are also details of different services and service providers, and relevant court orders and government policies, along with lots of other useful information.

Though Eyeway.org has been available to the public for quite some time, it was becoming difficult for us to update information or upload new content in absence of a fulltime programmer. We wanted to shift to a more dynamic database driven platform, which besides making the upload process simpler, would also make the website more accessible to our stakeholders as well as the search function more powerful and user-friendly. The solution was in implementing a Content Management System (CMS). We decided upon Plone as the CMS, and hired the services of Bangalore based Mahiti, to customize Plone for us and help us with the migration. On March 4, 2009, the



website with the new features was launched at a press conference, held at the Press Club of India, New Delhi, and it was widely reported in various sections of the media.

The highlights of our revamped website can be listed as

- A powerful search function
- Accessible CAPTCHA
- Better accessibility with a choice of text size and colour, and the background colour
- Text only or a text with graphics option
- And, of course, the ability to manage and upload content at our end.

After the site was re-launched, there was a moderate rise in number of queries, not only through phone and email on the helpdesk, but also through the submission forms on our website. We also received positive feedback from various quarters; most importantly—our users, who commended our efforts, and gave their inputs for further improvement, which we are seriously working on. Currently, on an average, the website gets around 6000 visits monthly.

Training Programmes

During the year, we have been able to coordinate and participate in a series of valuable workshops and events through our relationship with several key partners:

- Sensitization workshops vis-à-vis career for the blind, with Human Resources (HR) consultant Anubhuti Mittal, for the HR executives of Genpact and IBM Daksh in Delhi NCR.
- •Two motivational workshops with All India Confederation of Blind (AICB) in New Delhi for blind women and youngsters, in May.
- •Two workshops on communications skills, personality development, and motivation, with NAB India's women's programme at their Hauz Khas centre, in New Delhi.

Talks/Papers Presented

- At NAB New Delhi, in partnership with FICCI-Socio Economic Development Foundation, delivered a talk to a group of 50 visually impaired youngsters about 'Preparing for a Career', in May 2008.
- At the second Access India convention in Ahmedabad, in September 2008.
- At the Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO) annual partners' meet in Ranchi, in December 2008.
- At Indian Institute of Technology, New Delhi, as a part of the bicentennial celebrations of Louis Braille, in January 2009.
- In Pune, at a get-together of blind people from Maharashtra, which Eyeway helped organise, in January
- At the Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi, during the two-day national conference on disability, in March 2009

Additionally, George Abraham is a guest faculty at the Venu Institute for Universal Education, Delhi.

Empowered by Eyeway

Throughout the year, Eyeway has helped a number of visually impaired individuals across India overcome barriers in many areas of their lives. Some of these have been recounted below:



Education

Harshit Agarwal of Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh, has low vision due to Ocular Albinism. He requested his university for extra time to write his third year B. Com. examination. As the university was unaware of this provision for the visually impaired, they refused. Harshit did not give up. As a regular listener of our radio

show, he contacted the Eyeway helpdesk. We connected him to the Office of the Chief Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities (CCPD) in Delhi, a Mumbai based NGO that had earlier worked on a similar case, and Arushi—an NGO in Bhopal that immediately contacted the vice-chancellor of his university. Consequently, Harshit was given the extra time to write his exams.

We were also able to help a student pursuing Master's Degree in Computer Applications (identity withheld on request). His deteriorating eyesight made appearing in exams a major challenge during his post graduation. He asked for some consideration of extra time from his university based on what he thought were 'humanitarian grounds' for a vision-impaired student. He was not aware that the support he sought for was in fact his right. Nonetheless, he was apprised of his right during the course of a conversation, incidentally, just two days before his major examination. Apart from informing him of compensating facilities for vision-impaired students, Eyeway also quickly and successfully reached out to the student's university in its central office, which made the regional office aware of their own rule to provide 20 minutes extra per hour in examinations, to vision-



Another person inspired by our radio program, was Mayank Sharma, a 20-year-old student from Indore, Madhya Pradesh. His visual impairment was becoming a challenge for him in pursuing computer science engineering particularly the technical drawing modules. Through us, he was able to gain access to a scribe for

impaired students.

his exams that could help with the drawing. Mayank unfortunately did not pass his exam; he abandoned his degree and due to family pressure returned to his village to work at the family business. Through the helpdesk, we kept regular contact with him and encouraged him to continue studying and pursue the career he wanted within Information Technology (IT). Eyeway enabled Mayank to learn more about the access technology available, motivated him to educate his family on his condition, and got him in touch with other blind people

working in the sector. Motivated by the helpdesk, Mayank decided to pursue Bachelor in Business Administration (BBA). He has taught himself how to use a computer with JAWS (a screen reading software). As his family didn't want him to live alone, he lives with his brother who is also studying the same course in Agar, Madhya Pradesh. For peer support, we also connected him with two other blind students doing BBA from Symbiosis in Pune. Mayank is now enjoying life as a student looking forward to graduating into a fulfilling career.

As the above case studies illustrate, many universities and blind students are unaware of the rights of those with visual impairments. In order to overcome this, we intend to share this information through advocacy and plan to contact universities across India to ensure blind students are treated fairly.

Banking


Bidyut Kumar Das, a 35-year-old schoolteacher from Jamshedpur, Jharkhand, had called up the helpdesk after listening to our radio show. He needed help in getting a cheque book for himself from Canara Bank where he had his salary account and the bank was denying this facility due to his total blindness. We assured him that the bank cannot discriminate him on grounds of his blindness as the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) had issued a circular in this regard, and a copy of the same was sent to him immediately. Armed with this information, Bidyut approached the bank manager again with his request and was successful in obtaining the cheque book from the bank. Today, Bidyut is a more confident person as he knows that Eyeway is there to support him in all possible ways.

Connecting People

Alpana Dubey from Pune, Maharashtra had always been optimistic about life and had strong resolve to face challenges in reaching her ambitions. When Alpana lost her eyesight because of Menengitic Hydrocephalus, her strength of character and family support did not disrupt her optimism to reach her dreams. Through Eyeway's support (particularly the radio show and helpdesk), she constantly has the knowledge and motivation to lead a fulfilling life amidst blindness. We counselled Alpana when her usual confidence waned while choosing her course of study. We also connected her to an e-group of blind MBA and commerce students. Today, Alpana is confidently pursuing commerce, and simultaneously preparing for her MBA entrance exams.

Employment

A senior government employee (identity withheld on request) had been a consistent performer throughout his professional life. Life was moving at a smooth and decent pace until the year 2004, when he was suddenly detected with an incurable and degenerative eye disease—Retinitis Pigmentosa. In just a matter of four years, he lost 90% of his eyesight. Among the plethora of challenges that erupted from this diagnosis, one major and immediate issue that he had to deal with was on his professional front. In spite of submitting his disability certificate and informing his superiors about his recently acquired disability, his boss insisted that he opt for voluntary retirement and denied him of all his due



benefits including the deduction allowed to persons with disability in their income tax and the increased transport allowance. Determined to fight for his rights, he started gathering the resources and remembered the Eyeway radio shows, which he had been listening regularly since its launch in 2005. Last year, when he contacted Eyeway helpdesk for help, besides giving him full assurance that no one can dismiss/demote him from his job on grounds of disability, he was also made aware of the provisions for disabled persons under the law and provided with the supporting documents. In addition, Eyeway promised to provide legal assistance in his city if the problem persisted. Equipped with all this information, he was able to apprise his higher authorities and was successful in getting his due rights. This has reinforced our belief that information has the power to change people's lives.



Avdhesh Kumar Kaushal, secondary school science teacher in Kendriya Vidyalaya, Noida, Uttar Pradesh, was born with Retinitis Pigmentosa, degenerative retinal disorder that causes gradual vision loss. In spite of performing well in his work, he feared that with his diminishing vision he would soon lose his teaching job. Eyeway helpdesk gave Avdhesh confidence by informing

him of the job security to blind people as stated in the PWD Act, and about specific concessions and policies. He was also guided to get his disability certified from the district hospital. Avdesh found valuable support by being connected to other blind teachers in other parts of India. Today with a renewed sense of security, Avdesh continues to perform well at his job and is a source of inspiration for others. He is grateful to Eyeway for guiding him as he continues to adjust to his eye condition through the myriad of information and advice he gets from listening to the radio show.

Anil Kumar Chaurasia, a 24-year-old resident of village Dhaniya, Muzaffarpur, Bihar, has been a regular listener of our radio show since the last two years. Owing to high myopia, he was fired from his work in a construction company and financially was in a bad situation. Frustrated, he called up the helpdesk to seek guidance on the various jobs he could get despite his vision impairment. We encouraged him to pursue a career of his interest rather than taking up any odd job. During one of the counselling sessions, he expressed his desire to work in the insurance sector as an authorized agent of Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) and was advised to work towards it. However, the negative response received from the concerned authorities in his district discouraged him. Eyeway helped him again by not only inspiring him to pursue his career in the insurance sector but also guided him on the process including making him aware of his legal rights and the assistive technology available. Today, Anil is a successful LIC agent and is also pursuing his graduation through a regular college. Inspired by the support received from Eyeway, he is now keen to help other disadvantaged people in his village so that they are also able to realise their full potential in life.



Independent living


Punit Diwan trains computer programmers at multinational company Tata Consultancy Services, and is almost blind. Eyeway played a notable role in enabling Punit to experience the fulfilling personal and professional life he is currently living, after the onslaught of deteriorating eyesight, which redefined his life forever. Punit worked fulltime in a computer institute in Bhopal where

he had the owner's confidence of his capabilities, until his degenerating eyesight made him lose his reading ability. It was then that the institute told him that his services were no longer needed. The dismissal of Punit from his job eroded his confidence and he found himself in a confusing standstill; he did not know what to do next. He got to know about Eyeway through Access India mailing list and contacted us, where apart from responding to all of his queries, we encouraged him to build on his line of expertise in computer programming rather than start all over again. As he wanted to pursue a career as a technical writer, Eyeway put him in touch with other blind technical writers. Eyeway further assisted Punit to get back to his feet when he was forwarded a posting about an online computer-programming job. To his surprise, he got the job that was also convenient for him as it could be done from the comfort of his home. This career became both financially rewarding and fulfilling for Punit, who was promoted after some time. With a successful career established, and inspired by other blind persons leading an independent life, Punit now began to think of moving out of the comforts of his home to seek better opportunities for his career. But first he needed to convince his family of the viability of living independently. Eyeway then provided phone-counselling to his parents in order to make them realise that it is possible for a blind person to lead an independent life. Soon after his parents were convinced, Punit was accepted to participate in a multinational company's corporate social responsibility initiative—a 40-day intensive training to impart corporate skills to vision impaired people. As the training was conducted in Mumbai, Punit was also able to enhance his independent mobility during the training period. After the training, Punit's performance prompted the company to employ him, and he remains today as one of their software trainers for computer programmers. He now lives an independent life in Kerala, with a career of his interest in a dynamic work environment.

Parenting

Anjina Bhat of Noida, Uttar Pradesh, is the mother of three-year-old Arush, who is nearly blind because of retinal degeneration. Anjina has considered Eyeway a valuable knowledge and motivational resource in bringing up her son. The parenting section of our website provides her with information that helps her develop Arush's skills to become independent. We significantly facilitated the inclusion of Arush in a mainstream playschool by suggesting multisensory activities that made learning enjoyable for both—Arush and the other children in the playschool. We further helped Anjina in getting Arush admitted to the Delhi Public School, Vasundhara Enclave, where he continues to get mainstream education today.

Setting our sights on the future

- We are in the process of launching a Talking Book production and distribution centre to make reading material available in an audio format, for the blind students and professionals in the country.
- We plan to broadcast our radio shows on AIR's FM Rainbow channel covering nine prominent cities in India.
- With an intention to spread Eyeway in the non-Hindi speaking states of the country, we plan to conduct research in the eight states of the Northeast so that we can provide customized services from Eyeway in that region.
- Next on the anvil is extending the helpdesk through regional languages.
- We also plan to launch a Hindi version of the information portal






